### **ESCALATION IN THE WEST BANK ?**

INCREASED RISK OF ESCALATION IN THE WEST BANK AND POTENTIAL THREATS WITHIN ISRAEL



TACTICAL INTELLIGENCE REPORT



Israeli Military Intelligence (AMAN) has identified a heightened risk of escalation in the West Bank that may lead to significant unrest, potentially akin to previous intifadas. Recent incidents, including a powerful explosion in Tel Aviv, indicate increased militant capabilities and an elevated threat level, with potential for expanded violence within Israeli cities.

#### 1. Israeli Military Intelligence (AMAN):

- Role and Responsibilities: AMAN is a key component of the Israeli Defense Forces (IDF), responsible for intelligence collection, analysis, and operational support, providing critical insights into threats including potential escalations in the West Bank.

Characteristics: Intense clashes, frequent suicide bombings, and heavy Israeli military responses.
Impact: Significant casualties and property

damage on both sides, influencing current conflict dynamics.

#### **5. Suicide Operations in the West Bank:**

- Historical Context: During the Al-Aqsa Intifada, suicide bombings were a prominent tactic used by militant groups against Israeli targets.

- Current Threat: Recent intelligence suggests a potential resurgence of suicide operations, with locally-made explosives used in recent attacks, similar to past intifadas.



- Implications: Indicates high levels of organization and capability among militant groups, posing a significant threat to both military and civilian targets.

# 6. Palestinian Militant and Resistance Groups in the West Bank:

#### - Hamas:

- Overview: An Islamist militant group that governs Gaza and has a significant presence in the West Bank. Known for its military wing, the Izz ad-Din al-Qassam Brigades.
